: President's Message


Hello CTIA members!

Legislative Reception and Forest Hearing

Once again, the Colorado Timber Industry Association (CTIA) partnered with the Colorado/ Wyoming Society of American Foresters (SAF) and the Mountain States Lumber and Building Material Dealers Association (MSLBMD) to host the annual Legislative Reception, which was held on February 16th at the City Grill in Denver. The event was very well represented by the three organizations and drew a record crowd in terms of legislators stopping by to visit and learn about the important forestry issues affecting the state. Much of the night was spent educating those in attendance on the merits of House Bill 1255.







On February 17th, the Colorado State Forest Service hosted the Annual Forest Hearing for the Joint Agriculture Committee. Those testifying included: Mike Lester (State Forester), Jacque Buchanan (USFS), Norm Birtcher (Montrose Forest Products) and Bjorn Dahl (SAF). Norm did a fantastic job representing the forest industry in the state by highlighting the fact that forests in Colorado are in jeopardy, and desperately need management. He then thanked the USFS R2 for meeting their targets for 2015, while gently encouraging them to set higher targets for 2016. Norm wrapped up his testimony by hitting on the 3 elements of HB 1255.

House Bill 1255

House Bill 1255, which has passed the House and the Senate, is now waiting on Governor Hickenlooper's signature. This bill, originally sponsored by Representative Don Coram and Ed Vigil, and later sponsored by Randy Baumgartner in the Senate, highlights the importance of healthy forests in Colorado. HB 1255 has three parts:

- 1) Redirects \$200,000 of state funds for one or more demonstration projects that utilize Colorado's Good Neighbor Authority (GNA) to implement forest management treatments that improve forest health and resiliency and supply forest products to Colorado businesses.
- 2) Directs the Colorado State Forest Service, in conjunction with the Colorado Water Conservation Board, to compile and summarize findings from existing studies to quantify and document the importance of forest management in protecting and managing Colorado's water resources. This includes looking at the potential costs and effects on watersheds, communities, water users, and infrastructure if appropriate forest management does not occur and forested areas burn.
- 3) Creates a Forest Health Advisory Council to advise the State Forester on a broad range of issues, opportunities, and threats with regard to Colorado's forests.

Getting this bill passed was a priority for the Colorado Timber Industry Association and they had strong support from the Colorado/Wyoming Society of American Foresters, the water community, and Colorado Counties, Inc.




State of the National Forests by Tom Troxel

Just like a picture, the following graph is worth a thousand words. The graph is based on Forest Service data and shows the changes in annual growth, annual mortality, and annual harvest from national forest timberlands between 1952 and 2011. Three details – 1) timberlands are those lands capable of growing commercial timber and not withdrawn from timber harvest by statute or regulation, 2) net growth is the change in net volume minus the volume of trees that died, and 3) to estimate Billion Board Feet, multiply Million Cubic Feet times 5.

As of 2011, annual harvest was about 15% of annual net growth, and annual net growth was reduced and annual mortality was increased as a result of catastrophic fires and insect epidemics. Here in Colorado, the results are likely even more dramatic due to the high percentage of national forests affected by fires and bark beetles.



Following is a graph of volume sold from the national forests since 1905. The single event with the most significant effect on timber sales was the listing of the northern spotted owl as endangered in 1990. The high point was 13.8 BBF in 1970, and the low point was 1.5 BBF in 2001, followed by an agonizingly slow climb back up to just under 2.9 BBF in 2015.

FY 2017 APPROPRIATIONS by Tom Troxel

Having just finished FY 2016 Appropriations, the Administration and Congress are moving forward on FY 2017 Appropriations. The President's budget proposes flat spending (\$359 million) and flat outputs (3.2 BBF) for the Forest Service's timber sale program. The President's budget also proposes spending \$62 million from the Land and Water Conservation Fund for more land acquisition. Finally, a permanent fix for fire funding is again a high priority for the Administration, the Secretary of Agriculture, and the Chief of the Forest Service.

CTIA recommends the following:

- -Fix the fire funding problem, once and for all, including a) no more fire borrowing, b) reduce the percentage of the Forest Service's fire budget to the Forest Service's overall budget, c) invest more money in proactive forest management and fuels treatments to help the FS get ahead of the onthe-ground fire problem, and d) streamline the FS's analysis requirements so they can be more cost effective in implementing on-the-ground projects.
- -Increase the Forest Products budget by 5%
- -Increase the timber output goal to 4.0 BBF
- -Increase the Forest Roads budget by 5%
- -Don't spend a single dollar to purchase additional land for the national forests; redirect the money proposed for land purchases toward better management of existing national forest lands.

LYNX by Tom Troxel

Most of you understand the serious effects of the Forest Service's lynx amendments on forest management in Colorado's national forests. The virtual prohibition on pre-commercial thinning is having, and will have, detrimental effects on future habitat values and the health of the national forests. Arguably, the best part of the Forest Service's decision to approve the Southern Rockies Lynx Amendment was the requirement to review and reconsider when each forest plan is revised.

Wildlife biologists, foresters, and forest managers know much more today about lynx in Colorado than when the US FWS listed the lynx as Threatened back in 2000. We need to ensure that that new information is considered in the in the forest plan revisions on Colorado's national forests. For example, following are several 2014 quotes from the US Fish and Wildlife Service –

- -"verified evidence suggests that Colorado ... did not historically support a naturally resident lynx population over time."
- -"... we anticipate ... that Colorado and the Southern Rockies, in the absence of additional translocations of lynx from elsewhere, are unlikely to support lynx over the long term."
- -"... the available data suggests do not support that Colorado and the Southern Rockies contain the physical and biological features essential to lynx in adequate quantity and spatial arrangement to support lynx populations over time ..."
- -"...the contribution of the Southern Rockies to the persistence of lynx in the contiguous United States is presumably minimal ..."

CTIA and IFA will continue to advocate for changes to the Southern Rockies Lynx Amendment direction that consider long-term habitat for lynx and other wildlife, as well as long-term forest health and productivity. We encourage all CTIA members to participate in the forest plan revisions on this and other important issues.
